The date, time, and location of the meeting were advertised in the Chattanooga Times Free Press, on the City's Facebook page, and on the City of Red Bank website, together with instructions and an internet link to enable virtual attendance by the public and public access to the agenda and agenda items. I. Monthly Financial Update

CFO Pickel briefed the Commission on the current financial status of the City.

II. Automated Speed Enforcement for School Zones - Discussion Only

Police Chief Seymour and Ryan Moore, of Blue Line Solutions, gave an informative slide-show presentation on the traffic enforcement capabilities of the equipment proposed for use in school zones as allowed by statute.

III. On Consent Agenda - Report on Commissioners' Strategic Planning Retreat and Adopt the FY26 Mission, Vision, & Goals Res. No.26-1882

City Manager Granum presented the FY27 Vision, Mission, and Goals to the Commission, as represented in the MTAS Report dated February 26, 2026.

IV. On Consent Agenda - Approve AI Policy Res No. 26-1889

City Manager Granum gave a brief history of and the intent of the proposed policy, i.e., to establish a clear framework for the responsible, effective, and transparent use of AI within the City of Red Bank

V. On Consent Agenda - Accept a Charitable Donation from the Red Bank Soddy Daisy Foundation Agenda Item No. 26-893

Executive Office Manager Hackney gave a brief history and intent of the Red Bank and Soddy Daisy Charitable Foundation grants, i.e., to assist the City in support of broadly benefiting citizens and residents. The grant will be presented at the Regular Commission meeting later this date in an amount of \$23,500.00 for improvements at the Dog Park.

Executive Office Manager Hackney gave a brief history and intent of the Resolution, i.e., to replace the previously approved purchase of two electric trucks, of which Ford has ceased production, with two F-250's at a lesser cost. Purchase will be made from Lonnie Cobb Ford for a cost not to exceed \$101,275.00, from budgeted funds.

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners ("Board") determines that it is in the best interest of the City to modernize and improve its financial management and parks and recreation systems through the use of an integrated, cloud-based enterprise resource planning (ERP) solution; and

WHEREAS, Edmunds GovTech ("Edmunds") provides Edmunds Ethos, a cloud-native, browser-based ERP system designed specifically for government operations, including fully integrated financial management and Parks and Recreation modules; and

WHEREAS, the Edmunds Ethos software includes the following components as presented in the Edmunds flyer and Sales Order No. 00012069 dated March 18, 2026:

WHEREAS, the software will be purchased, pursuant to the authority of TCA §12-3-1205, from Software House International (SHI), which is an authorized reseller and approved vendor through the Sourcewell Cooperative Purchasing Program, and the City has a long-standing relationship with SHI; and

WHEREAS, the proposed agreement provides for the implementation and training in the first year at a one-time cost of \$5,685.60, followed by a one-time cost of \$14,290.99 to complete the implementation and an annual cost of \$21,207.29, not due until FY27.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF RED BANK, TENNESSEE, AUTHORIZING THE PURCHASE AND INSTALLATION OF A REPLACEMENT FENCE AROUND THE KIDS CORNER PLAYGROUND FOR THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT AT A QUOTED PRICE OF \$10,529.00 PLUS A 5% CONTINGENCY FOR A TOTAL PRICE NOT TO EXCEED \$11,055.00 FROM BRAVO FENCE; AND DESIGNATING AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT (ARPA) FUNDS AS THE FUNDING SOURCE; AND CONFIRMING THAT THIS EXPENDITURE IS CONSISTENT WITH THE ARPA FACILITY IMPROVEMENT SPENDING PLAN ADOPTED UNDER RESOLUTION 22-1477

WHEREAS, the City of Red Bank Public Works Department maintains the Kids Corner Playground as a public recreational facility for the benefit and enjoyment of residents and visitors alike; and

WHEREAS, the existing fence surrounding the Kids Corner Playground has deteriorated over time and requires replacement to maintain the integrity and maintenance standards of the facility; and

WHEREAS, on March 6, 2026, after soliciting not less than three price quotes in accordance with the City of Red Bank Procurement Policy, the Public Works Department submitted Requisition No. R-6873 for the complete replacement of the fence at Kids Corner Playground and recommending Bravo Fence as the contractor for this project; and

WHEREAS, Bravo Fence has submitted a proposal to remove the existing fence, install a new 4-foot-tall wooden fence with 4"x4" posts set in concrete, with four rails, new gate hardware, and required core drilling, for a total project price of \$10,529.00, to which staff also included a 5% contingency for unexpected costs; and

WHEREAS, this fence replacement project was not included in the FY-2026 Municipal Operating Budget and therefore requires an alternative funding source; and

WHEREAS, the City of Red Bank continues to administer its allocation of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds, which must be obligated and spent prior to their expiration in December 2026; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners previously adopted Resolution No. 22-1477 on March 22, 2022, approving the City's ARPA Spending Strategy, which included approximately \$1,150,000.00 allocated for Facility Improvements, including upgrades to parks, recreation spaces, and other public facilities for which this expenditure qualifies; and

WHEREAS, the Public Works Department intends to remove and preserve the hand-stenciled fence pickets bearing the handprints of children from the community and of volunteers who installed the original fence, and these preserved

pickets will later be used to construct a memorial feature inside the playground, honoring the community effort that originally built the site.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Red Bank, Tennessee, that:

SECTION 1.

The City Commission hereby authorizes the purchase and installation of a replacement fence for the Kids Corner Playground from Bravo Fence at a price not to exceed \$11,055.00, which includes a 5% contingency.

SECTION 2.

Funding for this project shall be provided from available American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds, which must be expended before their expiration in December 2026.

SECTION 3.

The City Commission affirms that this ARPA expenditure is fully consistent with and authorized under the Facility Improvements spending category adopted under Resolution 22-1477.

SECTION 4.

The City Manager or his designee is hereby authorized to execute all necessary purchase orders and associated documents to complete this procurement in accordance with City policy.

SECTION 5.

WHEREAS, each Public Safety Telecommunicator has exhibited compassion, understanding, and professionalism during the performance of their job every day.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF RED BANK, TENNESSEE TO DECLARE VACANT THE OFFICE OF JUDGE OF THE CITY COURT FOR THE CITY OF RED BANK, TENNESSEE

WHEREAS, the Honorable Johnny D. Houston, Jr. was re-elected to the Office of Judge of the City Court for Red Bank, Tennessee, for a third (3rd) term as of the general election held in August of 2024, and for a term of eight (8) years; and

WHEREAS, the Honorable Johnny D. Houston, Jr. has served the City diligently, honorably, ably, and with distinction for many years both prior to and since the August 2024 General Election; and

WHEREAS, on or about October 9, 2025, the Honorable Johnny D. Houston, Jr. suffered a disabling medical event of unknown origin and etiology which has tragically resulted in the need for constant and around-the-clock specialized critical medical care since that time and he is currently and has been for multiple months and weeks a patient at various critical care facilities including, but not limited to, Memorial Hospital in Chattanooga, Emory Hospital in Atlanta and the Emory Hospital Affiliated Sheperd Rehabilitation Treatment Facility in Atlanta for the several weeks next preceding the date of this Resolution and where he continues to undergo treatment and receive therapy; and

WHEREAS, anecdotal sharing of information by his family and by personal and professional acquaintances indicate that Judge Houston is and has been since October 9th, 2025, mentally and physically incapable of addressing and carrying out the duties and obligations of the Office of City Court Judge for the City of Red Bank, Tennessee and there are no predictions and/or prognostications that are known to exist indicating when or if he will or will ever be able to do so again in the future; and

WHEREAS, on or about January 21, 2026, Judge Houston's spouse filed a sworn Declaration/Petition with the Chancery Court of Hamilton County, Tennessee, asserting, among other things, that Judge Houston is "disabled" and unable to handle his own personal needs and/or business affairs and Judge Houston's spouse was thereafter granted Letters of Conservatorship by said Court on or about January 30, 2026, thereby judicially affirming Judge Houston's disability and inability to carry out the duties and obligations of the City Court Judge for the City of Red Bank, Tennessee; and

WHEREAS, on or about January 29, 2026, another Petition was filed in the Chancery Court for Hamilton County, Tennessee, once again asserting Judge Houston's medical maladies and condition, then and current inability to practice law and to carry out the duties incumbent upon a licensed attorney in the State of Tennessee to effectively manage his law practice and to protect his clients, and which, as a consequence thereof, Jennifer K. Exum, a licensed attorney, was appointed by said Chancery Court, as "Receiver" for Judge Houston's law practice again, because of Judge Houston's inability as above outlined and stated to carry out the duties of a licensed

attorney and to protect his clients' interests in the matter. That Order was entered on January 30, 2026, and that Receivership involving the active winding up and shutting down of Judge Houston's law practice is, upon inquiry, information and belief, thought to be presently ongoing as of the date of this Resolution; and

WHEREAS, on or about March 9, 2026, the Supreme Court for the State of Tennessee issued its ORDER transferring the law license of Judge Houston to "Disability Inactive Status" (which in no way implies any "disbarment") but which Order and Status means that Judge Houston, because of the above-referenced medical condition(s) and through no fault, intentional action or intentional inaction of his own, is not currently "an attorney licensed to practice law in the State of Tennessee;" and

WHEREAS, being "an attorney licensed to practice law in the State of Tennessee" is a fundamental requirement imposed by statute and by the City Charter for the Office of the City Judge for the City of Red Bank and Judge Houston is thereby no longer able to fulfill that fundamental requirement; moreover, there is no indication of progress sufficiently evident or indicative or provided to the City upon inquiry of if, when or whether Judge Houston will ever be able to do so in the future; and

WHEREAS, the City Commission and the City Administration, while greatly saddened by the tragic and highly distressing set of circumstances now surrounding Judge Houston's health and status, are nevertheless obligated and duty-bound to ensure the appropriate and continuing day-to-day functioning of the Red Bank City Court; and

WHEREAS, during the months of October, November and December of 2025, upon request of the City and as permitted by statute and City Charter, volunteer Judges from among the ranks of the five (5) General Sessions Court Judges in and for Hamilton County, Tennessee, served in an interim/temporary capacity and the Red Bank City Court continued to function seamlessly during the latter months of the calendar year 2025; and

WHEREAS, through a series of appointments via a series of Ordinances, while giving due regard to Judge Houston's continuing disabilities and in the midst of seemingly only marginally encouraging rehabilitation efforts, the City Commission appointed Bryan H. Hoss, a citizen of the City of Red Bank, licensed to practice law in the State of Tennessee and otherwise meeting all of the statutorily and by Charter imposed requirements for the office of City Court Judge as Temporary Judge to fill in and has ably conducted the City Court since approximately December 8, 2025, up until the date of this Resolution; and

WHEREAS, over a period of now in excess of five (5) months, the recovery progress of Judge Johnny D. Houston seems significantly limited and with no indication or seeming expectation or prognosis of sufficient recovery at any time in the foreseeable future to enable Judge Houston to once again become "an attorney licensed to practice law in the State of Tennessee" and/or to recover sufficiently from the ongoing mental and physical disabilities that now afflict him so as to enable him to effectively return and preside over the City Court for the City of Red Bank, Tennessee; and

WHEREAS, Section 6-2120 (6) of the City Charter provides (paraphrased) that a VACANCY in the office of the City Judge for the City of Red Bank, Tennessee occurs/is deemed to occur upon the death or resignation of the City Judge, “upon his (sic) ceasing to possess the qualifications of office, or upon his (sic) continued physical or mental disability for a period of three (3) months and declaration of same by a majority vote of the City Commission;” and

WHEREAS, as set out hereinabove and as is clearly evident, the Honorable Johnny D. Houston (1) is no longer qualified, by virtue of his law license being placed on disability inactive status by the Tennessee Supreme Court, to serve as City Court Judge for the City of Red Bank, Tennessee and (2) is and has been mentally and physically disabled for more than three (3) months next preceding the date of this Resolution, and (3) there is no reasonable expectation that Judge Johnny D. Houston will likely be able to recover sufficiently from the stated disabilities at any point in the near and/or foreseeable future and/or thereby to have his “license to practice law in the State of Tennessee” restored all as a consequence of the present disability(ies).

NOW, THEREFORE, based upon all of the foregoing, upon initiation of City Administration, consideration of all available evidence, the City Commission, with great regret, necessarily concludes, and it is:

RESOLVED:

1. That the Honorable Johnny D. Houston, Jr. is no longer, and at present, qualified as City Court Judge in that he is not licensed to practice law in the State of Tennessee as a consequence of the Order above referenced, by the Tennessee Supreme Court.
2. That the Honorable Johnny D. Houston, Jr. is and has been since on or about October 9, 2025, mentally and physically disabled to such an extent that he is unable to fulfill the duties and requirements of the Office of the City Court Judge for the City of Red Bank, Tennessee, which Office is accordingly hereby declared to be and is VACANT.
3. That the VACANCY, by City Charter, shall be filled by appointment of the City Commission of the City of Red Bank, Tennessee, of an Interim Judge who otherwise meets all Charter, statutory and constitutional requirements to serve as City Court Judge, as an Interim City Court Judge and to fill the VACANCY until the Office can be filled at the August 2026 General Election.
4. That the City Manager is authorized and directed to initiate all necessary and appropriate administrative measures to fulfill the letter and intent of this Resolution, and as relates to the VACANCY of Office declared hereby.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF RED BANK, TENNESSEE, AUTHORIZING THE ALLOCATION AND EXPENDITURE OF INTEREST EARNED ON AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT (ARPA) STATE AND LOCAL FISCAL RECOVERY FUNDS (SLFRF)

WHEREAS, the City of Red Bank received a distribution of federal funds from the United States Department of the Treasury under the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA) State and Local Fiscal Recovery Fund (SLFRF); and

WHEREAS, the City of Red Bank did by Resolution No. 22-1477 establish a spending strategy for the SLFRF funds in compliance with the U.S. Department of the Treasury guidelines and as required by the Comptroller of the Treasury for the State of Tennessee; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Department of the Treasury has provided further guidance that interest earned on SLFRF payments is not subject to the federal program restrictions of the ARPA award and may be used for any lawful governmental purpose; and

WHEREAS, the City of Red Bank desires to support community revitalization and local culture through the installation of a public mural project; and

WHEREAS, the City of Red Bank did receive a Community Support Grant award from the Red Bank and Soddy-Daisy Charitable Foundation in the amount of \$13,000.00 in support of the large-scale mural project proposed at Morrison Springs Road on the city-owned retaining wall; and

WHEREAS, following the property value reappraisal cycle in 2025, a tax rate adjustment error resulted in a projected revenue deficiency for the Fiscal Year 2026 (FY26) General Fund; and

WHEREAS, the City of Red Bank finds it in the best interest of the city to utilize accrued interest from the ARPA funds to address these specific needs without impacting the principal ARPA allocation.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF RED BANK, TENNESSEE:

SECTION 1. An allocation from the interest earned on ARPA/SLFRF funds is hereby authorized and appropriated for the expenditures related to the design, materials, and installation of a large-scale community mural located at Morrison Springs Road, being a city-owned retaining wall in the amount not to exceed the sum of \$125,000.00.

SECTION 2. All remaining interest earned on ARPA/SLFRF funds as of the date of June 30, 2026, shall be transferred and applied to the FY26 General Fund. These funds are specifically designated to offset the budgetary deficiency created by the tax rate adjustment error following the 2025 property reappraisal cycle.

SECTION 3. The Chief Finance Officer is hereby authorized to perform all necessary accounting entries, fund transfers, and budget amendments required to execute these allocations

in accordance with Comptroller of the Treasury for the State of Tennessee's local government budget laws.

SECTION 4. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

ORDINANCE 26-1303

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF RED BANK, TENNESSEE, TO AMEND CITY CODE TITLE 15, CHAPTER 3, SECTION 301 TO ESTABLISH A REVISED SPEED LIMIT ON STATE ROUTE 8 (DAYTON BOULEVARD) FROM THE STRINGERS RIDGE TUNNEL TO SIGNAL MOUNTAIN ROAD

WHEREAS, the City of Red Bank, Tennessee, has the authority pursuant to Tennessee Code Annotated §§ 55-8--152, §§ 55-8--153(c), and 6-54--303 to set and regulate speed limits on state routes, highways, and roadways lying within its municipal boundaries; and

WHEREAS, State Route 8 (Dayton Boulevard), from the Stringers Ridge Tunnel to Signal Mountain Road, lies fully within the corporate limits of the City of Red Bank; and

WHEREAS, the Tennessee Department of Transportation (TDOT) has recently completed resurfacing and restriping of this corridor, including a lane reconfiguration, reducing the roadway to three vehicular travel lanes and adding dedicated bicycle lanes; and

WHEREAS, this roadway modification has resulted in a functional change to the corridor, including lane narrowing, installation of multi-modal facilities, and modifications to traffic flow characteristics; and

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Red Bank has reviewed traffic engineering findings and crash data, and has determined that a reduction of the posted speed limit along this portion of State Route 8 is advisable, necessary, and appropriate to ensure roadway safety for motorists, cyclists, and pedestrians; and

WHEREAS, the City Commission desires to amend the Red Bank Municipal Code to reduce the speed limit from forty (40) miles per hour to thirty-five (35) miles per hour along this segment of roadway in order to reflect the new roadway design and to enhance public safety.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the City Commission of the City of Red Bank, Tennessee, that:

Section 1:

Title 15, Chapter 3, Section 15-301 of the Red Bank Municipal Code is hereby amended by adding the following subsection:

15-301(A). Dayton Boulevard/State Route 8 Corridor Speed Limit.

(i) The posted speed limit on State Route 8/Dayton Boulevard within the municipal limits of the City of Red Bank, Tennessee, which is a distance of approximately 234 feet from the northern entrance of the Stringers Ridge Tunnel, thence northwardly to the intersection of State Route 8/Dayton Boulevard and Signal Mountain Road (U.S. 127) and continuing North along Dayton Boulevard and ending at the intersection of Dayton Boulevard and Hedgewood Drive, a linear distance of 0.93 road miles, (4,910 feet) is hereby established at thirty-five (35) miles per hour.

Section 2.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Section 3.

If any section, clause, sentence, or phrase of this ordinance is declared unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining portions shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 4.

This ordinance shall take effect from and after the date of its passage on second and final reading and upon the posting of proper signage consistent with the Manual on Union Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD), the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of the City of Red Bank requiring it.

ORDINANCE NO. 26-1304

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF RED BANK, TENNESSEE, ESTABLISHING SPEED LIMITS FOR ASHLAND TERRACE AND ON DAYTON BOULEVARD IN THE AREA OF DOWNTOWN RED BANK

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the City of Red Bank is interested in establishing safe speed limits for vehicles traveling in the City; and

WHEREAS, traffic engineering studies have been conducted for Ashland Terrace and Dayton Boulevard; and

WHEREAS, such traffic studies have taken into account the newly established Point Christian Academy K-12 school on the Red Bank Baptist Church campus at the intersection of Dayton Boulevard and Ashland Terrace; and

WHEREAS, Title 15, Chapter 3 of the Municipal Code of the City of Red Bank states that a speed limit of 25 miles per hour will apply except where official signs have been posted indicating other speed limits, in which cases the posted speed limit shall apply; and

WHEREAS, the majority of City Commissioners have concluded that revisions of and to the City regulations and ordinances with respect to the establishment of speed limits are desirable, necessary, and appropriate for the betterment of the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the City Commission of the City of Red Bank, Tennessee, as follows:

Section 1.

Title 15, Chapter 3, Section 15-301 of the Red Bank Municipal Code shall be amended by adding the following subsection:

15-301(B). Excepting times immediately prior to, during, and after school hours when school zone speed limits may be in effect:

- i. There is established a maximum speed limit of 35 miles per hour for all of Ashland Terrace from its terminus at the intersection with Dayton Boulevard, thence eastward to the city limit line, and
- ii. There is established a maximum speed limit of 35 miles per hour for Dayton Boulevard from its intersection with Woodrow Avenue on the north and extending to its intersection with E. Leawood Avenue on the south.

Section 2: A penalty of up to \$50 shall be imposed for each violation of this ordinance.

Section 3: This ordinance shall take effect from and after the date of its passage on second and final reading and upon the posting of proper signage consistent with the Manual on Union Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD), the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of the City of Red Bank requiring it.

Section 4: Each sentence and clause hereof is separate and severable, and any declaration of invalidity of any part hereof shall not render inapplicable or illegal the remaining portions hereof.

Section 5: The passage of this Ordinance shall not override, nullify, or supersede any other school zone-related speed limit Ordinance in effect on portions of Dayton Boulevard and Ashland Terrace, it being the specific intent of the City that school zone-related Ordinances shall be construed in *paria materia* with this Ordinance.

ORDINANCE NO. 26-1305

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF RED BANK, TENNESSEE TO AMEND CITY CODE TITLE 15, CHAPTER 3, SECTION 301 WITH RESPECT TO SPEED LIMITS IN SCHOOL ZONES AND TO ESTABLISH THE PARAMETERS OF SUCH SCHOOL ZONES

WHEREAS, the City has the authority pursuant to T.C.A. § 49-2-116, et seq. to establish school zones/school safety traffic zones and to regulate and to set speed limits and various traffic safety regulations therein; and

WHEREAS, with the recent establishment of Point Christian Academy at 4000 Dayton Boulevard, Red Bank, Tennessee 37415, it has become appropriate and necessary to amend the aforesaid Ordinance and to establish a school zone/school safety traffic zone and therefore, to set speed limits and to reconsider other formerly established and reestablished school zone/school safety traffic zones for Red Bank Middle School, Red Bank High School, and Alpine Crest Elementary School; and

WHEREAS, MUTCD-compliant traffic engineering studies have been conducted for Alpine Crest Elementary School, Red Bank High School, Red Bank Middle School, and Point Christian Academy, prospective schools and contiguous streets and roadways; and

WHEREAS, employees of the City of Red Bank have undertaken a review, a study, and an examination of the City's regulations and Ordinances with respect to the establishment of special speed limits in the City of Red Bank; and

WHEREAS, Point Christian Academy was recently established as a school and has heretofore had no special speed limit designation; and

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Red Bank, the City Police Chief, and the City Mayor have all concluded that revisions of and to the City regulations and ordinances with respect to the establishment of special speed limits for school zones are desirable, necessary, and appropriate for the betterment of the City and its citizens.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Red Bank, Tennessee, as follows:

Section 1.

Motor Vehicles, Traffic and Parking of Title 15, Chapter 3, Section 15-303, inclusive of the Red Bank City Code, is deleted in its entirety, and there is substituted in its place and stead the following:

15-303. In school zones. Pursuant to Tennessee Code Annotated, § 55-8-152, the city has the authority to enact special speed limits in school zones. It shall be unlawful for any person to violate any such special speed limit enacted and in effect in accordance with this Ordinance and this Section of the Red Bank City Code:

- (A) There is hereby reaffirmed and reestablished a school zone/school traffic safety zone for Red Bank High School and Red Bank Middle School, located at 640 Morrison Springs Road, Red Bank, Tennessee 37415; and 3701 Tom Weathers Drive, Red Bank, Tennessee 37415, respectively.

- (1) The School Zone Speed Limit on Morrison Springs Road and on Tom Weathers Drive for Red Bank High School and for Red Bank Middle School shall be twenty-five (25 MPH) miles per hour.
 - (2) The School Zone shall extend from the western city limit line on Morrison Springs Road to a point, which is five hundred (500) feet east, with and along the southern right-of-way line of Morrison Springs Road from the intersection of Tom Weathers Drive.
 - (3) On Tom Weathers Drive, the School Safety Traffic Zone shall extend to the east and north along Tom Weathers Drive from the entrance to the school property to the Morrison Springs Road intersection at which point said school zone shall become coincident with the Red Bank High School school zone referenced in 15-303(A)(1) and (2).
 - (4) Such School Zone Speed Limits for Red Bank High School and Red Bank Middle School shall be in effect when advisory signage is posted which recites the times for which the school zone speed limits are in effect and is, if applicable, in operation if equipped with a mechanical and/or electrical and flashing light system.
- (B) There is hereby reaffirmed and reestablished a school zone/school traffic safety zone for Alpine Crest Elementary School, located at 4700 Stagg Road, Red Bank, Tennessee 37415; and
- (1) The School Zone Speed Limit on Stagg Road for Alpine Crest Elementary School shall be fifteen (15 MPH) miles per hour. The School Zone shall extend from the intersection of Stagg Road and Appian Way to the school grounds at the end of Stagg Road.
 - (2) The School Zone for Alpine Crest Elementary School is also re-established and reaffirmed on Appian Way; the School Zone/School Safety Traffic Zone shall extend for a distance of five hundred (500) feet in both directions on Appian Way from the intersection of Stagg Road and Appian Way.
 - (3) Such School Zone Speed Limits for Alpine Crest Elementary School shall be in effect when advisory signage is posted which recites the times for which the school zone speed limits are in effect and is, if applicable, in operation if equipped with a mechanical and/or electrical and flashing light system.
- (C) There is hereby established and affirmed a School Zone/School Traffic Safety Zone for Point Christian Academy, located at 4000 Dayton Boulevard, Red Bank, Tennessee 37415;
- (1) The School Zone Speed Limit on Dayton Boulevard and Ashland Terrace for Point Christian Academy shall be twenty-five (25 MPH) miles per hour.
 - (2) The School Zone shall extend from Dayton Boulevard for a distance of five hundred (500) feet north from the intersection of Dayton Boulevard and Ashland Terrace and for a distance of five hundred (500) feet south from the intersection of Dayton Boulevard and the northern right-of-way line of Lawton Street.
 - (3) The School Zone for Point Christian Academy is also established on Ashland Terrace; the School Safety Traffic Zone shall extend for a distance of five hundred (500) feet to the east with and along Ashland Terrace, from the north easternmost

corner of the Red Bank Baptist Church property on the southern right-of-way line on Ashland Terrace.

- (4) A School Zone Speed Limit of fifteen (15 MPH) miles per hour is established and applicable from Lawton Street at its intersection with Dayton Boulevard east to its intersection with Tacoma Avenue.
- (5) A School Zone Speed Limit of fifteen (15 MPH) miles per hour is established and applicable on Tacoma Avenue from its intersection with Lawton Street north to the intersection with Bank Street.
- (6) A School Zone Speed Limit of fifteen (15 MPH) miles per hour is established and applicable on Bank Street from its intersection with Tacoma Avenue in a generally easterly direction to the intersection of Bank Street and Ashland Terrace.
- (7) Such School Zone Speed Limits for Point Christian Academy shall be in effect when advisory signage is posted, which recites the times for which the school zone speed limits are in effect and is, if applicable, in operation if equipped with a mechanical and/or electrical and flashing light system.

Section 2. Every section, sentence, clause, and phrase of this Ordinance is separable and severable. Should any section, sentence, clause, or phrase be declared unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, said unconstitutionality or invalidity shall not affect or impair any other section, sentence, clause, or phrase.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage on second and final reading, the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of the City of Red Bank requiring it.

RESOLUTION NO. 26-1895

A RESOLUTION BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF RED BANK, TENNESSEE, AUTHORIZING AN AGREEMENT WITH BLUE LINE SOLUTIONS, INC. FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION AND OPERATION OF AN AUTOMATED SPEED ENFORCEMENT SERVICES PROGRAM WITHIN THE CITY

WHEREAS, the City of Red Bank, Tennessee, has a duty to promote and protect the public health, safety, and welfare of its citizens, including the safety of motorists, pedestrians, and school children on public roadways; and

WHEREAS, excessive vehicle speed within school zones, “S” curves, and other designated areas pose a significant risk to public safety; and

WHEREAS, Tennessee Code Annotated § 55-8-198 authorizes municipalities to implement unmanned traffic enforcement camera programs in school zones and “S” curves in compliance with state law; and

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Red Bank finds that the use of automated speed enforcement technology in school zones and “S” curves may assist law enforcement by deterring speeding violations, improving traffic safety, and enhancing data related to traffic patterns; and

WHEREAS, Blue Line Solutions, Inc. is experienced in providing automated speed enforcement systems, equipment, and related services; and

WHEREAS, the City of Red Bank desires to enter into a service agreement with Blue Line Solutions, Inc. to provide automated speed enforcement services in school zones and “S” curves in accordance with applicable state law and City policies; and

WHEREAS, the Services Agreement is available at no net cost to the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Commission of the City of Red Bank that:

Section 1. The City Commission hereby authorizes the City of Red Bank to enter into a service agreement with Blue Line Solutions, Inc., for the purpose of providing automated speed enforcement services, including the installation, operation, maintenance, and administration of automated speed enforcement systems, in school zones and “S” curves and in compliance with Tennessee law.

Section 2. The automated speed enforcement program authorized by this Ordinance shall be operated in accordance with Tennessee Code Annotated § 55-8-198 and all other

applicable state and federal laws, rules, and regulations. The program shall be limited to locations and circumstances permitted by law, including but not limited to school zones and other authorized areas, if applicable.

Section 3. The Mayor or City Manager is hereby authorized to execute the service agreement with Blue Line Solutions, Inc., subject to approval as to form and legality by the City Attorney, and to take such further actions as may be necessary to carry out the intent of this Resolution.

Section 4. Nothing in this Ordinance or the resulting agreement shall be construed as delegating law enforcement authority to a private entity. All final determinations regarding violations, notices, or enforcement shall remain with the City and/or its authorized officials as required by law.
