The City Commission of the City of Red Bank, Tennessee, met in a public and duly advertised Agenda Work Session on April 7, 2026, at 4:30 p.m. at the Commission Chambers located at 3117 Dayton Boulevard. The date, time, and location of the meeting were advertised in the Chattanooga Times Free Press, on the City's Facebook page, and on the City of Red Bank website, together with instructions and an internet link to enable virtual attendance by the public and public access to the agenda and agenda items. The purpose of the meeting was to receive information on and discuss upcoming business items. Those in attendance were Mayor Stefanie Dalton, Vice Mayor Hollie Berry, Commissioner Jamie Fairbanks-Harvey, Commissioner Terri Holmes, and Commissioner Hayes Wilkinson. Also present were City Manager Martin Granum, City Attorney Arnold Stulce, Jr., Police Chief Dan Seymour, Fire Chief Brent Sylar, Public Works Director Greg Tate, Community Development Director Leslie Slay, Chief Finance Officer Kris Pickel, City Recorder Tracey Perry, and those listed on Exhibit A.

I. Budget 101 and a look at the [building of the budget](#)

City Manager Granum presented a brief overview of the preparation of the budget and addressed all five (5) Commission goals. A video and audio recording of the meeting is preserved. See the recording for more information.

II. On Consent Agenda - Agreement with Edmunds for Finance and Parks and Rec management for \$21,207.29 per year Res No. 26-1890

DAF Perry gave a brief overview of the additional functions provided by this new finance software and advised the Commission that this transition will require less funding than our current software after the implementation is complete. The agreement is with Edmunds GovTech for an annual amount not to exceed \$21,207.29 for the first three (3) years.

III. On Consent Agenda - Approve contract with Bravo Fence for replacement of Kid's Corner fence in the amount of \$10,529.00 Res No. 26-1891

Public Works Director Tate advised the Commission of the need to install a new fence around the playground located at 3817 Redding Road. The agreement is with Bravo Fence for a cost not to exceed \$10,529.00.

IV. On Consent Agenda - Recognize National Telecommunicator's Week 2026 is April 12-18, 2026 Res No. 26-1892

DAF Perry read parts of the Resolution and asked that the Commission proclaim the week of April 12-18, 2026, as National Telecommunicators' Week.

V. On Consent Agenda - Authorizing the allocation and expenditure of interest earned on American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) state and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) Res No. 26-1894

City Manager Granum explained that the Resolution proposed to utilize \$125,000.00 of the interest that had been earned by the ARPA funds over the last few years to fund the mural project at the concrete wall on Morrison Spring's Road, across from the Food City. It also allocated the remaining earned interest to be deposited in the General Fund. After much discussion, staff will present this matter

VI. On Consent Agenda - Declare vacant the Office of the Judge of the City Court for the City of Red Bank, TN Res No. 26-1893

City Manager Granum advised that this Resolution is for the Commission to declare the City Judge's seat vacant, after the elected judge's status was placed on disability inactive status

by the TN Board of Professional Responsibility. Much discussion occurred.

VII. Third Quarter Budget Amendments - first reading - Ord No. 26-1302

Chief Finance Officer Pickel advised that this Ordinance will amend the FY26 budget to allocate additional and approved spending that was not previously budgeted.

VIII. Proposed Speed Limit Reduction from Stringer's Ridge Tunnel to Hedgewood Drive Ord No. 26-1303

Public Works Director Tate advised the Commission that this Ordinance will reduce the speed limit on Dayton Blvd from Stringer's Ridge Tunnel to Hedgewood from 40 mph to 35 mph.

IX. Proposed Speed Limit Change on Ashland Terrace and on Dayton Boulevard in the downtown area Ord No. 26-1304

Police Chief Seymour advised the Commission that this Ordinance will change the speed limit on Ashland Terrace and on Dayton Blvd in the downtown area

X. Proposed Establishment of School Zones and Speed Limits Ord No. 26-1305

Police Chief Seymour advised the Commission that this Ordinance will officially establish school zones in Red Bank and the speed limits within those school zones.

XI. Agreement with Blue Line Solutions Resolution Res No. 26-1895

Chief Seymour advised the Commission that this Resolution will authorize an agreement with Blue Line Solutions for the implementation and operation of an automated Speed Enforcement Services Program in school zones and the "S" curves on Ashland Terrace. Much discussion ensued.

VII. City Manager Granum's Report

- At every Commission meeting since late October, I have reminded us of the condition of our elected Judge, Johnny Houston. This evening, the Commission will take action to declare the Office of the Judge of the City Court for the City of Red Bank, Tennessee, to be vacant, and so my regular updates will cease. But I ask that we all keep Johnny in our hearts and in our prayers as he continues his recovery.
- We are now in the final quarter of FY26. Our belt-tightening strategy is working, as it also impacts staff capability. Mayor Dalton read the title of the Resolution. Vice Mayor Berry made a motion to approve, seconded by Commissioner Fairbanks-Harvey. Much discussion, A few citizens inquired about installing rumble strips on Dayton Blvd, asking how the 35 mph speed limit was determined for Ashland Terrace, asking how the revenue will be shared, and whether the fines can be dedicated to safety initiatives. Resolution No. 26-1895 was approved with four Commissioners voting "yes". Commissioner Wilkinson voted "no".

F. RESOLUTION NO. 26-1893 A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF RED BANK, TENNESSEE TO DECLARE VACANT THE OFFICE OF JUDGE OF THE CITY COURT FOR THE CITY OF RED BANK, TENNESSEE

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF RED BANK, TENNESSEE, AUTHORIZING THE CITY OF RED BANK TO ENTER INTO A CONTRACT WITH WRIGHT BROTHERS CONSTRUCTION COMPANY, INC. FOR THE RESURFACING OF DAYTON BOULEVARD (TIP PROJECT NO. 130155) FOR A PRICE NOT TO EXCEED \$441,048.00, WHICH INCLUDES A 5% CONTINGENCY

WHEREAS, the City of Red Bank entered into a contract with the Tennessee Department of Transportation in February 2019 under resolution 19-1276 to repave and restripe a portion of Dayton Boulevard from the intersection of Browntown Road and Wickley Road to the intersection of Dayton Boulevard and Gadd Road; and

WHEREAS, this project is identified as TIP Project No. 130155 and is funded through a Tennessee Department of Transportation (TDOT) grant with Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) participation; and

WHEREAS, funding for this project is based on an 80/20 match, with eighty percent (80%) funded by FHWA/TDOT and twenty percent (20%) funded by the City of Red Bank, as previously authorized by Resolution No. 20-1360; and

WHEREAS, the City did advertise for, receive, and accept a bid from Wright Brothers Construction Company, Inc. for the resurfacing of this portion of Dayton Boulevard in the amount of \$420,045.10; and

WHEREAS, the proposed contract amount, along with a 5% contingency for miscellaneous or unexpected costs, shall not exceed Four Hundred Forty-One Thousand Forty-Eight Dollars and Ten Cents (\$441,048.00); and

WHEREAS, the FHWA/TDOT grant funding and the City of Red Bank funds set aside for the 20% match for construction are sufficient funding to cover the construction and remaining project management of this project; and

WHEREAS, the contract is a standard TDOT contract contained in the TDOT "Bid Book," which includes TDOT standards, specifications, material quantities, and all required contract documents, including the contract presented with this resolution; and

WHEREAS, the contract includes the TDOT-required Payment and Performance Bond in the full contract amount; and

WHEREAS, execution of this contract will allow Wright Brothers Construction Company, Inc. to immediately begin the resurfacing project upon issuance of the Notice to Proceed.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Commission of the City of Red Bank, Tennessee, that:

1. The City hereby authorizes the execution of a contract with Wright Brothers Construction Company, Inc. for the resurfacing of Dayton Boulevard from Browntown Road and Wickley Road to the Dayton Boulevard and Gadd Road intersection, identified as TIP

Project No. 130155, for an amount that shall not exceed \$441,048.00, subject to the terms and conditions of the TDOT standard contract documents.

2. The contract shall be an 80/20 federally funded project, with FHWA/TDOT providing eighty percent (80%) of the funding and the City of Red Bank providing twenty percent (20%), as previously authorized by Resolution No. 20-1360.
3. The TDOT “Bid Book,” including all applicable standards, specifications, material quantities, the executed contract, this resolution, and the required Payment and Performance Bond, shall constitute the complete contract documents.
4. Upon full execution with all required signatures, the entire Bid Book shall be made available on the City of Red Bank’s website for public access.
5. The City Manager is hereby authorized to execute all documents necessary to carry out the intent of this resolution upon passage, the public welfare requiring it.

ORDINANCE 26-1303

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF RED BANK, TENNESSEE, TO AMEND CITY CODE TITLE 15, CHAPTER 3, SECTION 301 TO ESTABLISH A REVISED SPEED LIMIT ON STATE ROUTE 8 (DAYTON BOULEVARD) FROM THE STRINGERS RIDGE TUNNEL TO HEDGEWOOD DRIVE

WHEREAS, the City of Red Bank, Tennessee, has the authority pursuant to Tennessee Code Annotated §§ 55-8--152, §§ 55-8--153(c), and 6-54--303 to set and regulate speed limits on state routes, highways, and roadways lying within its municipal boundaries; and

WHEREAS, State Route 8 (Dayton Boulevard), from the Stringers Ridge Tunnel to Hedgewood Drive, lies fully within the corporate limits of the City of Red Bank; and

WHEREAS, the Tennessee Department of Transportation (TDOT) has recently completed resurfacing and restriping of this corridor, including a lane reconfiguration, reducing the roadway to three vehicular travel lanes and adding dedicated bicycle lanes; and

WHEREAS, this roadway modification has resulted in a functional change to the corridor, including lane narrowing, installation of multi-modal facilities, and modifications to traffic flow characteristics; and

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Red Bank has reviewed traffic engineering findings and crash data, and has determined that a reduction of the posted speed limit along this portion of State Route 8 is advisable, necessary, and appropriate to ensure roadway safety for motorists, cyclists, and pedestrians; and

WHEREAS, the City Commission desires to amend the Red Bank Municipal Code to reduce the speed limit from forty (40) miles per hour to thirty-five (35) miles per hour along this segment of roadway in order to reflect the new roadway design and to enhance public safety.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the City Commission of the City of Red Bank, Tennessee, that:

Section 1:

Title 15, Chapter 3, Section 15-301 of the Red Bank Municipal Code is hereby amended by adding the following subsection:

15-301(A). Dayton Boulevard/State Route 8 Corridor Speed Limit.

(i) The posted speed limit on State Route 8/Dayton Boulevard within the municipal limits of the City of Red Bank, Tennessee, which is a distance of approximately 234 feet from the northern entrance of the Stringers Ridge Tunnel, thence northwardly to the intersection of State Route 8/Dayton Boulevard and Signal Mountain Road (U.S. 127) and continuing North along Dayton Boulevard and ending at the intersection of Dayton Boulevard and Hedgewood Drive, a linear distance of 0.93 road miles, (4,910 feet) is hereby established at thirty-five (35) miles per hour.

Section 2.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Section 3.

If any section, clause, sentence, or phrase of this ordinance is declared unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining portions shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 4.

This ordinance shall take effect from and after the date of its passage on second and final reading and upon the posting of proper signage consistent with the Manual on Union Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD), the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of the City of Red Bank requiring it.

ORDINANCE NO. 26-1304

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF RED BANK, TENNESSEE, ESTABLISHING SPEED LIMITS FOR ASHLAND TERRACE AND ON DAYTON BOULEVARD IN THE AREA OF DOWNTOWN RED BANK

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the City of Red Bank is interested in establishing safe speed limits for vehicles traveling in the City; and

WHEREAS, traffic engineering studies have been conducted for Ashland Terrace and Dayton Boulevard; and

WHEREAS, such traffic studies have taken into account the newly established Point Christian Academy K-12 school on the Red Bank Baptist Church campus at the intersection of Dayton Boulevard and Ashland Terrance; and

WHEREAS, Title 15, Chapter 3 of the Municipal Code of the City of Red Bank states that a speed limit of 25 miles per hour will apply except where official signs have been posted indicating other speed limits, in which cases the posted speed limit shall apply; and

WHEREAS, the majority of City Commissioners have concluded that revisions of and to the City regulations and ordinances with respect to the establishment of speed limits are desirable, necessary, and appropriate for the betterment of the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the City Commission of the City of Red Bank, Tennessee, as follows:

Section 1.

Title 15, Chapter 3, Section 15-301 of the Red Bank Municipal Code shall be amended by adding the following subsection:

15-301(B). Excepting times immediately prior to, during, and after school hours when school zone speed limits may be in effect:

- i. There is established a maximum speed limit of 35 miles per hour for all of Ashland Terrace from its terminus at the intersection with Dayton Boulevard, thence eastward to the city limit line, and
- ii. There is established a maximum speed limit of 35 miles per hour for Dayton Boulevard from its intersection with Woodrow Avenue on the north and extending to its intersection with Crisman Street on the south.

Section 2: A penalty of up to \$50 shall be imposed for each violation of this ordinance.

Section 3: This ordinance shall take effect from and after the date of its passage on second and final reading and upon the posting of proper signage consistent with the Manual on Union Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD), the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of the City of Red Bank requiring it.

Section 4: Each sentence and clause hereof is separate and severable, and any declaration of invalidity of any part hereof shall not render inapplicable or illegal the remaining portions hereof.

Section 5: The passage of this Ordinance shall not override, nullify, or supersede any other school zone-related speed limit Ordinance in effect on portions of Dayton Boulevard and Ashland Terrace, it being the specific intent of the City that school zone-related Ordinances shall be construed in *paria materia* with this Ordinance.

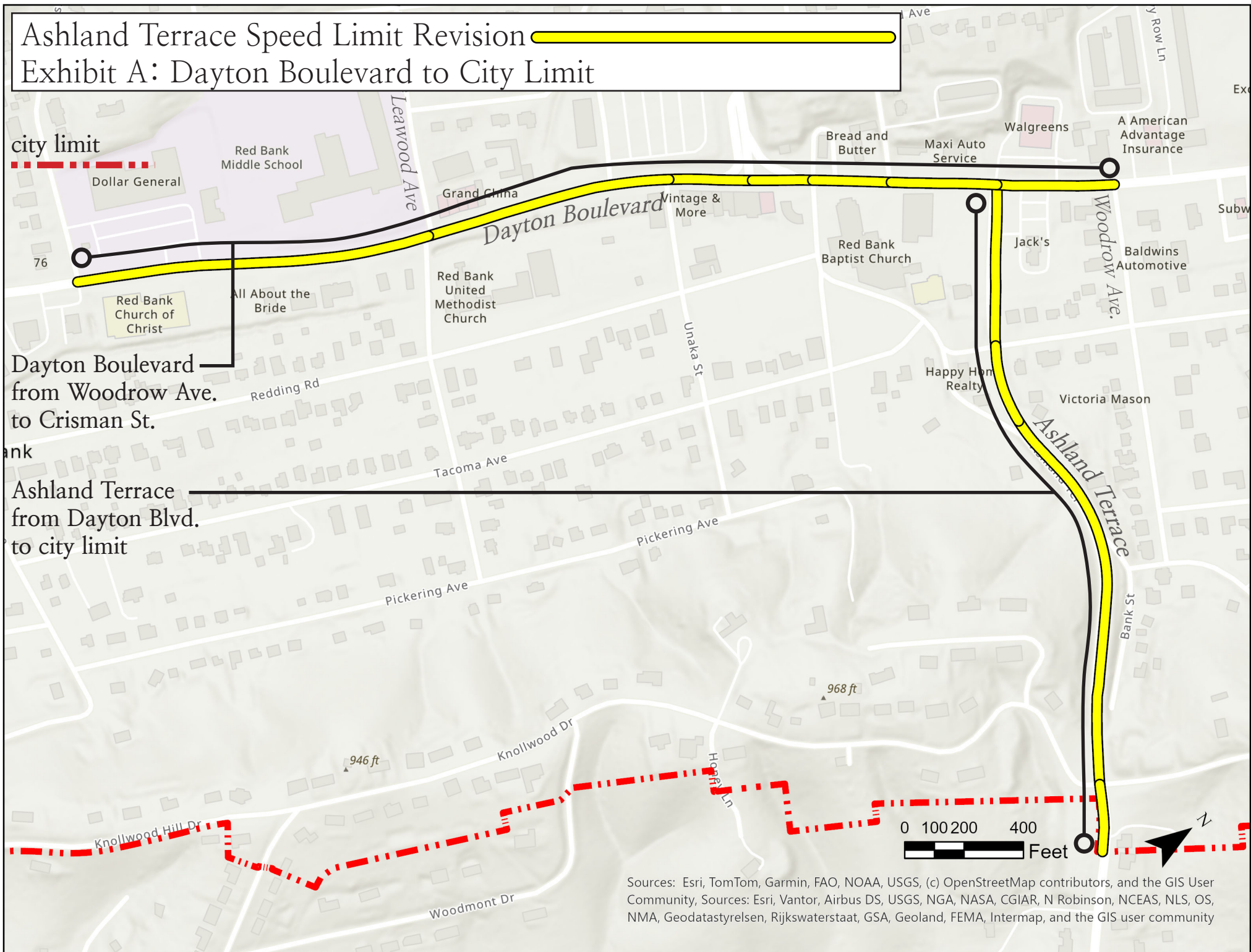

ORDINANCE NO. 26-1305

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF RED BANK, TENNESSEE TO AMEND CITY CODE TITLE 15, CHAPTER 3, SECTION 301 WITH RESPECT TO SPEED LIMITS IN SCHOOL ZONES AND TO ESTABLISH THE PARAMETERS OF SUCH SCHOOL ZONES

WHEREAS, the City has the authority pursuant to T.C.A. § 49-2-116, et seq. to establish school zones/school safety traffic zones and to regulate and to set speed limits and various traffic safety regulations therein; and

WHEREAS, with the recent establishment of Point Christian Academy at 4000 Dayton Boulevard, Red Bank, Tennessee 37415, it has become appropriate and necessary to amend the aforesaid Ordinance and to establish a school zone/school safety traffic zone and therefore, to set speed limits and to reconsider other formerly established and reestablished school zone/school safety traffic zones for Red Bank Middle School, Red Bank High School, and Alpine Crest Elementary School; and

WHEREAS, MUTCD-compliant traffic engineering studies have been conducted for Alpine Crest Elementary School, Red Bank High School, Red Bank Middle School, and Point Christian Academy, prospective schools and contiguous streets and roadways; and

WHEREAS, employees of the City of Red Bank have undertaken a review, a study, and an examination of the City's regulations and Ordinances with respect to the establishment of special speed limits in the City of Red Bank; and

WHEREAS, Point Christian Academy was recently established as a school and has heretofore had no special speed limit designation; and

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Red Bank, the City Police Chief, and the City Mayor have all concluded that revisions of and to the City regulations and ordinances with respect to the establishment of special speed limits for school zones are desirable, necessary, and appropriate for the betterment of the City and its citizens.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Red Bank, Tennessee, as follows:

Section 1.

Motor Vehicles, Traffic and Parking of Title 15, Chapter 3, Section 15-303, inclusive of the Red Bank City Code, is deleted in its entirety, and there is substituted in its place and stead the following:

15-303. In school zones. Pursuant to Tennessee Code Annotated, § 55-8-152, the city has the authority to enact special speed limits in school zones. It shall be unlawful for any person to violate any such special speed limit enacted and in effect in accordance with this Ordinance and this Section of the Red Bank City Code:

- (A) There is hereby reaffirmed and reestablished a school zone/school traffic safety zone for Red Bank High School and Red Bank Middle School, located at 640 Morrison Springs Road, Red Bank, Tennessee 37415; and 3701 Tom Weathers Drive, Red Bank, Tennessee 37415, respectively.

- (1) The School Zone Speed Limit on Morrison Springs Road and on Tom Weathers Drive for Red Bank High School and for Red Bank Middle School shall be twenty-five (25 MPH) miles per hour.
 - (2) The School Zone shall extend from the western city limit line on Morrison Springs Road to a point, which is five hundred (500) feet east, with and along the southern right-of-way line of Morrison Springs Road from the intersection of Tom Weathers Drive.
 - (3) On Tom Weathers Drive, the School Safety Traffic Zone shall extend to the east and north along Tom Weathers Drive from the entrance to the school property to the Morrison Springs Road intersection at which point said school zone shall become coincident with the Red Bank High School school zone referenced in 15-303(A)(1) and (2).
 - (4) Such School Zone Speed Limits for Red Bank High School and Red Bank Middle School shall be in effect when advisory signage is posted which recites the times for which the school zone speed limits are in effect and is, if applicable, in operation if equipped with a mechanical and/or electrical and flashing light system.
- (B) There is hereby reaffirmed and reestablished a school zone/school traffic safety zone for Alpine Crest Elementary School, located at 4700 Stagg Road, Red Bank, Tennessee 37415; and
- (1) The School Zone Speed Limit on Stagg Road for Alpine Crest Elementary School shall be fifteen (15 MPH) miles per hour. The School Zone shall extend from the intersection of Stagg Road and Appian Way to the school grounds at the end of Stagg Road.
 - (2) The School Zone for Alpine Crest Elementary School is also re-established and reaffirmed on Appian Way; the School Zone/School Safety Traffic Zone shall extend for a distance of five hundred (500) feet in both directions on Appian Way from the intersection of Stagg Road and Appian Way.
 - (3) Such School Zone Speed Limits for Alpine Crest Elementary School shall be in effect when advisory signage is posted which recites the times for which the school zone speed limits are in effect and is, if applicable, in operation if equipped with a mechanical and/or electrical and flashing light system.
- (C) There is hereby established and affirmed a School Zone/School Traffic Safety Zone for Point Christian Academy, located at 4000 Dayton Boulevard, Red Bank, Tennessee 37415;
- (1) The School Zone Speed Limit on Dayton Boulevard and Ashland Terrace for Point Christian Academy shall be twenty-five (25 MPH) miles per hour.
 - (2) The School Zone shall extend from Dayton Boulevard for a distance of five hundred (500) feet north from the intersection of Dayton Boulevard and Ashland Terrace and for a distance of five hundred (500) feet south from the intersection of Dayton Boulevard and the northern right-of-way line of Lawton Street.
 - (3) The School Zone for Point Christian Academy is also established on Ashland Terrace; the School Safety Traffic Zone shall extend for a distance of five hundred (500) feet to the east with and along Ashland Terrace, from the north easternmost

corner of the Red Bank Baptist Church property on the southern right-of-way line on Ashland Terrace.

- (4) A School Zone Speed Limit of fifteen (15 MPH) miles per hour is established and applicable from Lawton Street at its intersection with Dayton Boulevard east to its intersection with Tacoma Avenue.
- (5) A School Zone Speed Limit of fifteen (15 MPH) miles per hour is established and applicable on Tacoma Avenue from its intersection with Lawton Street north to the intersection with Bank Street.
- (6) A School Zone Speed Limit of fifteen (15 MPH) miles per hour is established and applicable on Bank Street from its intersection with Tacoma Avenue in a generally easterly direction to the intersection of Bank Street and Ashland Terrace.
- (7) Such School Zone Speed Limits for Point Christian Academy shall be in effect when advisory signage is posted, which recites the times for which the school zone speed limits are in effect and is, if applicable, in operation if equipped with a mechanical and/or electrical and flashing light system.

Section 2. Every section, sentence, clause, and phrase of this Ordinance is separable and severable. Should any section, sentence, clause, or phrase be declared unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, said unconstitutionality or invalidity shall not affect or impair any other section, sentence, clause, or phrase.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage on second and final reading, the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of the City of Red Bank requiring it.

RESOLUTION NO. 26-1898

A RESOLUTION BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF RED BANK, TENNESSEE, APPOINTING AN INTERIM RED BANK CITY COURT JUDGE PURSUANT TO THE RED BANK CITY CHARTER

WHEREAS, Part 5, Section 6-21-501 of the Red Bank City Charter authorizes the Board of Commissioners to appoint a City Court Judge when a vacancy exists or when an interim appointment is necessary; and

WHEREAS, the office of Red Bank City Court Judge requires continuous occupancy to ensure the orderly and lawful administration of justice for the City of Red Bank, Tennessee; and

WHEREAS, a temporary appointment is necessary to serve until a City Court Judge may be elected and duly sworn in following the next appropriate municipal election; and

WHEREAS, the salary/compensation of the Red Bank City Court Judge was set by Ordinance No. 22-1215; and

WHEREAS, Attorney Bryan Hoss is a member in good standing of the Tennessee Bar and is qualified by training and experience to serve as City Court Judge; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the City of Red Bank finds that the appointment of an interim City Court Judge pursuant to the City Charter is in the best interest of the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Red Bank, Tennessee, as follows:

1. Appointment Pursuant to Charter Authority

In accordance with Part 5, Section 6-21-501 of the Red Bank City Charter, Attorney Bryan Hoss is hereby appointed as Red Bank City Court Judge, effective April 25, 2026.

2. Term of Appointment

The appointment shall remain in effect until a successor City Court Judge is elected and sworn into office following the next appropriate election, or until otherwise replaced or qualified pursuant to law.

3. Powers and Duties

The appointed City Court Judge shall exercise all powers, duties, and responsibilities of

the office as provided by the Red Bank City Charter, the Red Bank Municipal Code, and the laws of the State of Tennessee.

4. Compensation

The salary/compensation of the City Court Judge was set by Ordinance No. 22-1215 at the rate of \$2,640.76 per month for the fourth twelve (12) months of the eight (8) year term, which is the current twelve (12) months. The salary/compensation will increase at the beginning of the fifth twelve (12) months and so forth through the end of the eight (8) year term.
